If You Want To Stop the Genocide, Build a New International Security and Development Architecture

The following is the Schiller Institute's invitation for the Dec. 9–10, 2023 conference on the New International Security and Development Architecture, sponsored by the Central American and Caribbean Critical Thought (CPCCC) organization. The presentations beginning at 10 a.m. EST on Saturday, Dec. 9 will be available via [Zoom](#), with simultaneous interpretation in English, French, German and Spanish.

Do you believe that Man is fundamentally good and capable of infinitely perfecting the creativity of his mind and the beauty of his soul? Would you agree that all evil is the result of a lack of development, and therefore can be overcome?
